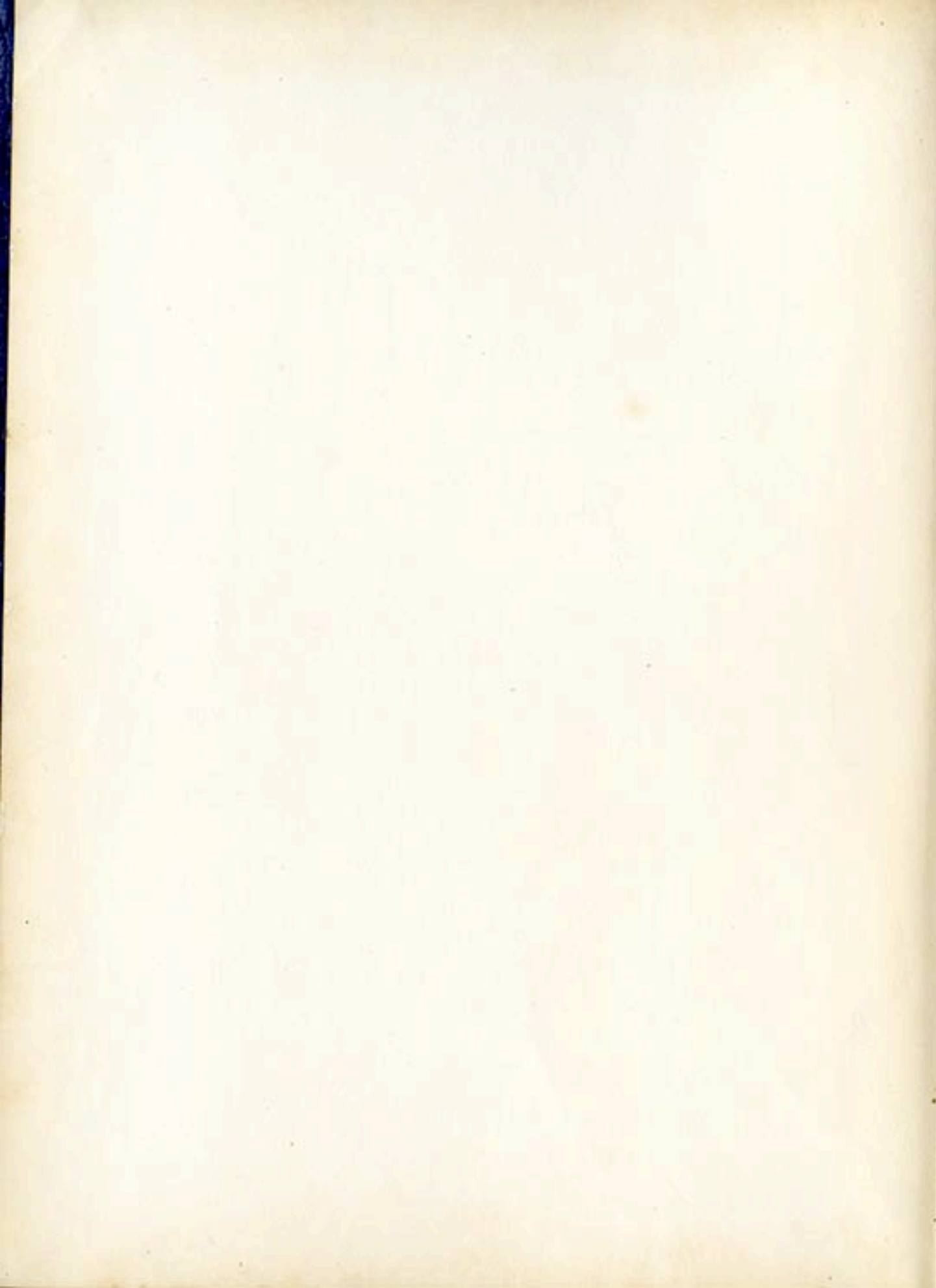

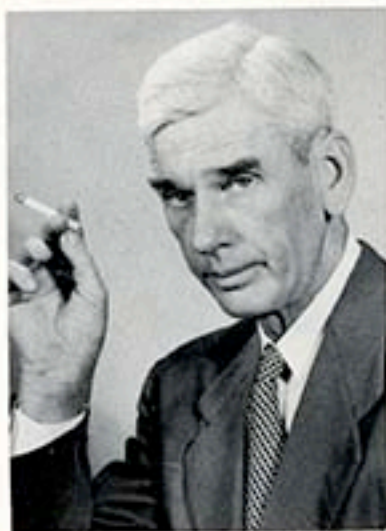

CLASS HISTORY

Participants in the Junior Oratorical Contest are: Ronald Laney, Annie Reid, Joyce Douglas, Frankie Allison, Berthine Hart, and Lucy Knox. Joyce Douglas is the winner of that memorable night. Showing athletic skills are: Berthine Hart, Annie Reid, Betty Sloan, Hazel Kerns, Richard Black, George Stinson, Ray Donaldson, Keith Connor, Jay Lee Grier, and Adrian Nelson. Cheerleaders for these athletes are: James Means, Joyce Douglas, Hazel Kerns, and Betty Sloan.

Act IV arrives at last, and is warmly received. Even that arch-villain, "Study" seems less formidable.

Senior class advisors are: Mrs. G. W. Campbell and Mrs. E. S. Johnson. Officers of the class are: President, Ronald Laney, Vice-President, William Gaston; Secretary, Joyce Douglas; Treasurer, Larry Walker.

The action is more rapid and more complicated than in preceding act. There is more comedy than before and there are some delightful interpolations. The most memorable ones are: Senior Day in Greensboro, College Day, and Career Day.

Despite all the gayety, grim preparations are going on, to the end that those who are now stars may remain so and that others may continue in the cast at all. Many hearts are weak with anxiety. As the act nears its close, faces and brows drawn with worry are noticed. For it is realized that this is the final struggle. Victory now means freedom from that dreaded "Study" and "Examinations."
