Novelist Sheri Reynolds to read from "A Gracious Plenty" in 900 Room

Novelist Sheri Reynolds, a 1989 Davidson graduate and honoree of Oprah Winfrey's Book Club, will speak at Davidson College on Thursday, Feb. 19. The free public reading from her newest novel "A Gracious Plenty" will begin at 8:15 p.m. in the 900 Room of the College Union.

"The Rapture of Canaan," Reynolds's second novel, caught Oprah's attention and became an instant best-seller after the TV host named it as a selection for her on-air book club. Oprah called Reynolds's book "very fulfilling."

"The Rapture of Canaan" is a coming-of-age story set in the restrictive but loving world of a Pentecostal community. Ninah is the young hero-

ine whose life is molded by her grandparents and the teachings of their "fire and brimstone" religion. She makes a mistake that brings the wrath of the community down upon her, but it also provides the impetus for her to take charge of her future.

Reynolds dedicated her highly acclaimed first book "Bitterroot Landing" to three Davidson College faculty and staff members — English Professors Gail Gibson and Libby Mills, and student services staff member Ruth Pittard.

Reynolds currently teaches a graduate fiction course and undergraduate literature courses at Old Dominion University. She received her M.F.A. from Virginia Commonwealth University and has also taught at the College of William and Mary.
