### Fifth annual FLAG Fashion Show wows audience


Violinist Koljonen performs stellar recital

Distinguished chamber musician and recitalist Martha Koljonen presented a violin recital in Hodson Hall on Monday, Nov. 9. Accompanying Koljonen were pianists Ruskin Cooper, a

teaching associate in the Davidson Music Department, and Katerina Souvorova, Davidson's staff accompanist. Koljonen is also Davidson's violin instructor and director of string studies,

Koljonen's program included "Tempo di Minuetto in the Style of Paganini" by Fritz Kreisler and "Three Dances for Solo Violin" by Donna Kelly Eastman. She also presented Beethoven's Sonata No. 1 in G Major, Op. 96 and Brahms' Sonata No. 3 in D Minor, Op.108. Despite the challenging nature of the repertoire,



Koljonen gave spirited, energetic, and immaculate performances of each of these works. The crowd responded with great enthusiasm and reverent applause upon the conclusion of the Brahms sonata, a work that demanded both virtuosity and stamina.

Koljonen began studying violin at age eight in Detroit. She earned her Bachelor of Music degree from Cleveland Institute of Music where she studied with David Cerone. Koljonen has also studied under Mischa Mischakoff and Jasha Brodsky.

Her career has included playing in the Opera Orchestras of Santa Fe and St. Paul, the Alabama Symphony, and the Virginia Symphony. She has served as concertmaster in both the Savannah Symphony and the Charlotte Symphony. She has been a member of the Charlotte Symphony since

Koljonen has also co-founded and played with numerous smaller musical groups. In Savannah, she was a founding member of the Chamber Soloists of Savannah. She was the violinist of the Birmingham Musica Antiqua and also in the New Cadek Piano Quartet in Tuscaloosa, Ala. In the Charlotte and Davidson area, Koljonen is the violinist in the Nikos Trio.
